

🐾 GLEBELANDS TRAIL ~ Nature, art and history in the historic heart of Yatton



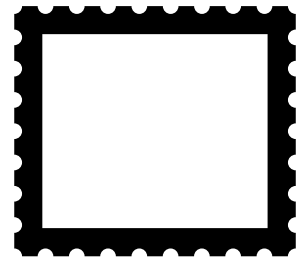
Start the trail near the High Street at the junction with Church Road near the entrance to the car park.

3. On the stone there are small carvings of local wildlife made by Sam Powell, a local stonemason. Can you find them all? Tick them off below:

4. In the pebble mosaic circle made by retired teacher Andrew Bryden and children from Yatton Junior School, what is the animal in the middle?

5. What two species of butterfly are pictured on the information board about Wildlife in Yatton?

Carry on up the path, bear right onto the higher level.

6. What species are the 4 big trees growing in the grass in front of the Village Hall? Draw a leaf shape in the box.



7. What type of plant is growing all along the wall between the car park and Glebelands Park _____ (By any other name it would smell as sweet, Shakespeare said.)

Turn left after the bench and litter bin.

8. On the wall between the park and the cottage, can you see the letter Y for Yatton? This framed collage was made by Natasha Pester from things found in the soil when the park was extended and restored in 2006. The Y is made of clay tobacco pipes. What do you think the rest of the mosaic is made of?

Go down the slope past the bollards and turn right into the Causeway

9. On the path you might notice thin needle-like leaves from a tree above. Can you see the big old tree (it is about 200 years old)? Do you know what kind of tree it is? Write its name here _____

What are its seed-cases called? _____ Can you see any?

Turn right and walk along the big concrete kerb or across the grass. Look at the benches along the wall.

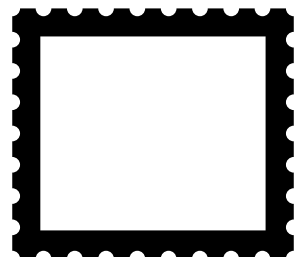
10. How many years did Queen Elizabeth II reign as Queen before she celebrated her platinum jubilee?

Walk under the second arch to retrace your steps, but before you leave the park near the Rainbow Stone, look across to the house on the corner which was once a shop. Can you see the ring on the wall? (it has been painted over). What do you think it was used for 100 years ago? There is a clue - or lots of them - in the pebble mosaic!
